### 2016 SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS ANNOUNCED

After much deliberation on the part of the Pi Gamma Mu Awards Committee, the committee's chairperson, Dr. Clara Small, recommended 10 scholarship winners to the Board of Trustees. The Board awarded scholarships to the following lifetime members of Pi Gamma Mu:

The \$2000 Carroll Parish Scholarship was awarded to Samantha Sabin. Sabin earned a B.S. degree in Psychology from Reinhardt University where she joined the Georgia Rho chapter in 2013. She is currently enrolled in graduate school at Georgia State University in Atlanta and is seeking a Ph.D. in Psychology, with a concentration in Community Psychology. After completing her bachelor's degree, she worked for Child Protective Services as a family preservation specialist case manager. Her experience as a case manager led her to search for a way to continue her work and elicit real change. Continuing her education in Psychology provided this opportunity. 
### The following were awarded \$1000 Pi Gamma Mu scholarships:

# EARN FUNDS TO BRING STUDENTS TO THE 2017 TRIENNIAL INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION



Each chapter is building a reserve of convention funding at Pi Gamma Mu headquarters. It grows every time you send applications for membership and initiation fees. The Convention Reserve Fund was established by action of the international Board of Trustees to encourage more chapters to participate in convention activities. Each chapter who sends a delegation to the convention will receive funding.

\$2 from each \$50 initiation fee sent into our office goes into a fund to be used at the time of the next convention by the chapter who sent in that member. The funds accumulate over the three year period leading up to the convention. Suppose your chapter initiated 50 members during the three years leading up to the convention - then your convention fund would equal \$100. This amount will be mailed to the chapter sponsor prior to the convention after a delegate from the chapter has registered for the convention.

The next Triennial International Convention will be held in Kansas City, MO, November 2-4, 2017. Learn about the convention by visiting http://pigammamu.org/convention-2017.html Earn more funding for your chapter by initiating more members this year. The more members you send in, the more funding you will earn!

Convention Reserve Fund payouts are capped at \$500 per chapter. If your chapter does not attend the convention, this amount will be expended for general convention costs.

A significant goal of Pi Gamma Mu is to bring the ideals of scholarship, collaboration, and service to colleges and universities around the world through reactivating and establishing new chapters of Pi Gamma Mu at these institutions. # 2015-16 GUEST LECTURESHIP GRANTS

The Trustees of Pi Gamma Mu have established the lectureship fund for the purpose of advancing the social sciences and to serve as a memorial to deceased officers of this honor society. The following chapters received a Pi Gamma Mu lectureship grant during the 2015-16 fiscal year:

### Georgia Rho

The Georgia Rho chapter at Reinhardt University received a \$300 Pi Gamma Mu Guest Lectureship Grant to help bring Cheryl L. Brown to campus. Brown provided a lecture entitled, "I am not an Army of One: Creating an Interdisciplinary Team." The event was held at the Glass House on Reinhardt University's Waleska, Georgia campus. Brown is a Professor of Sociology at Greensboro College and is a co-founder of an international non-profit organization, *Vidas de Esperanza*, dedicated to improving the lives of Latino youth in North Carolina and in rural areas of Mexico through increased access to education, technology, and medical care. M. Katrina Smith is the sponsor of the Georgia Rho chapter.

#### New York Sigma

The New York Sigma chapter at Le Moyne College was awarded a \$300 lectureship grant to bring Melinda Messineo to a function jointly hosted by the New York Sigma chapter and LeMoyne's Council of Honor Societies. The event was held at the Genesee Grande Hotel located in the heart of Syracuse's historic University Hill neighborhood. Messineo is an Associate Professor of Sociology at Ball State University. The topic of her lecture was, "What Facebook Knows about You that You don't Know They Know". Messineo has numerous publications on the sociology of social media and is an award-winning teacher. Jeffrey Chin is the sponsor of the New York Sigma Chapter.

### Mississippi Theta

The Mississippi Theta chapter at Blue Mountain College received a \$300 grant to bring Thomas E. Parson to campus. Parson is a park ranger at the Corinth Civil War Interpretive Center, a unit of Shiloh National Military Park. He has also written several feature articles in Blue & Gray Magazine. Stewart Bennett is the faculty sponsor of the Mississippi Theta chapter.

#### Pennsylvania Alpha Omicron

The Pennsylvania Alpha Omicron chapter at Washington & Jefferson College applied for and received a Guest Lectureship Grant of \$300 to bring Dr. Roy Tamashiro to campus. Dr. Tamashiro gave a lecture entitled "Once Upon a Peace Pilgrimage: Reframing "Who Am I' for Planetary Consciousness". In July 2015, Dr. Roy Tamashiro, a professor of Multidisciplinary Studies at Webster University (St. Louis, MO), answered a "calling" to embark on a Peace Pilgrimage. His "assignment" was to highlight the rise of "planetary-peace consciousness," while commemorating and reflecting on the 70th anniversary of the dropping of atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. His pilgrimage has included North America, the Pacific, Asia and Europe, where he has given commemorative/memorial services, and has led workshops, seminars, and student peace camps. In this interactive presentation, Dr. Tamashiro shared stories from his pilgrimage and exchanged his insights with students and faculty at Washington & Jefferson College. Zheya Gai is the faculty chapter sponsor of the Pennsylvania Alpha Omicron chapter.

- 6. Social Service the primary purpose of science is to know and to enable us to do. What we know we want to put to work for the benefit of humanity.
- 7. Sacrifice we are engaged in the greatest and finest of all the arts, the building of human society. Without giving freely, fully, and sacrificially of means, time, talent, energy and passion, all our other ideals will fall short and the contributions we hope to bring will never come.

### SYMBOLS OF PI GAMMA MU

The motto of the Society is the epigram of the Master Teacher, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free."

The society's **key** has a wreath at the bottom to suggest that social science is the outgrowth and fulfillment of natural science. The running figure is reminiscent of the ancient Greek torch race and symbolizes humanity bringing knowledge to the solution of its own problems and passing on the light from generation to generation.

The colors are blue and white - for truth and light.

The official flower is the blue and white cineraria.
