




STUDENT PRESENTER LOOKS BACK ON THE 2017 TRIENNIAL INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

Back in November 2017, I attended the Triennial International Convention of Pi Gamma Mu, the oldest interdisciplinary academic honor society in social sciences. I walked away with a few conclusions. First and foremost, it was plain to see that academic curiosity in the social sciences is alive and well in undergraduate universities. Specifically, students now, more than ever, seek to tackle issues whose remedies can only come from interdisciplinary analysis. This pushback against narrow, discipline-centric academic analysis is at once critique of the way disciplinization within the social sciences imbues power and acknowledgment of the complexity of postmodern (i.e. globalized and rapid, technology-based, capitalist-dependent) social problems.

Certainly, there's something of immense value to specialization, the extensive exploration of any one topic within the social sciences. Who, though, will thread together those findings to create an impactful social analysis? Certainly that is one of the central tasks of the burgeoning academics in the social sciences, those in attendance at the Triennial most certainly among them! The Convention was exciting, exciting, and useful—I'm looking forward to 2020.

Nicholas Croce is a Pi Gamma Mu Lifetime Member (New York Phi, Nazareth College of Rochester). His paper, "Predicting the Fifth Phase: Interpellation, World Systems Theory, and the Fall of Nation States" was presented at the 2017 Pi Gamma Mu Triennial International Convention and published in the International Social Science Review. He was recently accepted into the Social Science Ph.D. program at the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Syracuse University. The program was established in 1946 as the nation's first doctoral program committed to interdisciplinary study in the social sciences. He plans to continue studying the intersections of social policy, the accumulation of capital and its effects on mobility, and globalization.

The theme for the conference was "Promoting Social Change through Building Resilience".

Student presenters were as follows: Nadale Celestine with research entitled "Where Are We Now? Recommendations to Improve Campus Climate, Promote Inclusion, and Strengthen Diversity"; Janice Tucker presented research entitled "Because I Learn!: An Exploratory Note on the Academic Identity of African-American"; Mustapha Yoosuf-Akinlaja presented "An Investigation of Student Beliefs on Climate Change: Myth or Reality"; Srey Bruney, Zaphany Banks, and Scylar Allen presented "The Hidden Impact of Technology: An Employee's Perspective"; and Elliott Howard presented "Understanding the Crisis: Drug Death Rates in Louisiana and Student Perceptions of Substance Abuse Counseling".

Dr. Dorothy Idleburg of Alcorn State University, Dr. Frances Staten of Grambling State University, and Dr. Alma Thornton and Professor Kriste Perry of Southern University also organized an Undergraduate

Student Panel which focused on "Social Movements in America in Era of President Donald Trump". Panelists included: Janice Tucker, Nadale Celestine, and Elliot Howard (Me Too - Grambling State University), Takaila Oliphant (Black Lives Matter – Alcorn State University), Caleb Penn and Nnonye Asonye (Alt-Right- Southern University) and Yoosuf-Akinlaja (Antifa-Grambling State University).

Additionally, Dr. Farrah Gafford, Dr. Lamar Shields, Mr. David Yokley, Louisiana Eta Alumni, and former members of Grambling's Social Research Club traveled from a distant Texas, Maryland, and Chicago to participate in a "Thematic Memorial Panel", organized by Dr, Frances Staten, to honor the Late Dr. Joseph Johnson, the third president of Grambling State University who died February 2018. Other panelists included: Dr. John Nwoha, Professor Clarence Williams, Dr. George Whaley, and Dr. Earl Vinson (via technology), and Dr. Lurie Thomason (via technology). The tribute ended in a video reflection prepared by Louisiana Eta Chapter Governor and Special Assistant, Ms. Inetha Wimberly and Project BEAP Volunteer, Ms. Demetria Shelton.
